## 9 Guidance

## 2 Chronicles 20:1-30

All of us are faced with the constant need for guidance. What career should I pursue? Whom should I marry? Where should I live? Should I change jobs? In which church activity should I invest my time? How should I spend my weekend? From the major and critical questions of life to daily and mundane situations, we are bombarded by matters which demand a decision. Jehoshaphat, king of Judah from 870-845 B.C., found himself in the same position. He needed to discern God's direction in a time of crisis. In 2 Chron. 20:1-30 we see principles of guidance which can help us to hear God's voice.

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1. In what areas of your life do you presently need guidance?
2. Read 2 Chron. 20:1-30. Describe the situation confronting Jehoshaphat (2 Chron. 20:1-2).
Imagine yourself in a similar situation. What would you be feeling and thinking?
<b>3.</b> What is Jehoshaphat's immediate response (2 Chron. 20:3-4)?
<b>4.</b> In Jehoshaphat's prayer, how does he perceive himself and God (2 Chron. 20:5-12)?
<b>5.</b> Jehoshaphat's prayer evidences a knowledge of Scripture. How can Scripture help us in seeking guidance?
6. By what further means does God guide (2 Chron. 20:13-17)?

Although such direct guidance is extraordinary, what principles of guidance can we learn from this prophecy
7. In what ways does Jehoshaphat respond to the guidance he receives (2 Chron. 20:18-21)?
8. How might you have responded? Why?
9. What is the result of Jehoshaphat's obedience to God's guidance (2 Chron. 20:22-30)?
10. What principles about seeking God's guidance do we learn from Jehoshaphat's example?
11. How can you apply these principles in your current needs for guidance?
